


GENERAL FUND APPROPRIATIONS

CRIME STATISTICS

- Burglary down from 31 to 30 (down by 1)
- Larceny down from 129 to 125 (down by 4)
- Aliso Viejo Special Enforcement Team (SET)
- Tasked with suppression of criminal activity, monitors local gangs, investigate's gang related crimes, suppression in targeted areas as well as unusual patrol problems.

TRACKING AUTOMATED & GRAFFITI REPORTING SYSTEM (TAGRS)

County wide system that is capable of storing and tracking graffiti incidents. This system is
used by law enforcement agencies to identify and prosecute graffiti suspects. This system
also allows city public works, Orange County Transportation Authority and cities entities
access to input graffiti information into the system. Once a suspect is identified,
prosecution and restitution can take place.

HOMELESS LIAISON OFFICER (HLO)

• This deputy is assigned to work with identifying the homeless in the city and providing them with basic necessities such as bus passes, food, water, motel vouchers and other county resources.

TERRORISM LIAISON OFFICER (TLO)

• This deputy works with other law enforcement agencies and first responders with terrorism early-warning systems and uncovers intelligence that could help fight anti U.S. Forces.



ACCOMPLISHMENTS

- The Wood Canyon Wetlands project received the CASQ Award for 2014 Outstanding Storm Water Quality Project.
- The City was awarded \$193,749 in grant funds for catch basin filters and improved quality of urban runoff through education outreach.
- Aliso Viejo received a Pavement Condition Index rating of 86.9 out of 100 for maintaining the street system in "Very Good" condition.
- The City achieved compliance of its New Housing Element
- Construction is underway on the new Vantis Hotel and Apartment project.
- Development of new recreational and educational programs for our senior citizens. The City is also contracting for senior transportation to neighboring senior centers.
- Construction of the new half-court basketball area at Iglesia Community Park was completed in the summer.
- The City developed a new "branding" look that is reflected in all public literature including the City's newsletter, website and public correspondence.
- Adopt-a-School program was implemented this year that calls for a Sheriff's deputy visiting one of our schools twice a week during the deputy's normal day shift.
